

Daniel Benjamin has been the Director of the John Sloan Dickey Center for International Understanding at Dartmouth College since 2013. Ambassador Benjamin was nominated by President Obama to serve as Ambassador-at-Large and Coordinator for Counterterrorism at the State Department and confirmed by the United States Senate in May 2009. In that position, he was Secretary Hillary Clinton's principal advisor on issues related to terrorism, countering violent extremism and homeland security. Before joining the Obama Administration, Benjamin was director of the Center on the United States and Europe at the Brookings Institution. During more than five years on the National Security Council staff in the 1990s, Benjamin served as a foreign policy speechwriter and Special Assistant to President Bill Clinton and as Director for Transnational Threats.

Benjamin is the co-author of *The Age of Sacred Terror* (2002), which was awarded the Arthur Ross Prize of the Council on Foreign Relations and was named a New York Times Notable Book and a Washington Post Best Book of 2002. He has written on international affairs for The New York Times, Politico, TIME Magazine and many other publications. Benjamin began his career as a journalist and was a foreign correspondent for TIME Magazine and Germany Bureau Chief for The Wall Street Journal. He holds degrees from Harvard and Oxford, where he was a Marshall Scholar.
