Beth Williams is Director of the Robert Crown Law Library and Senior Lecturer in Law at Stanford Law School. She teaches courses in advanced legal research and her research interests include the intersection of information ethics, concepts of social justice, and government publication, digitization and preservation, and open access publishing, particularly as these areas apply to libraries and legal information management. She has also taught courses in foreign and international legal research, knowledge management, introduction to philosophy and ethics.

Prior to joining Stanford, Professor Williams was Associate Vice Chancellor for the Law Library and Information Technology Services at Louisiana State University's Paul M. Hebert Law Center and previously held positions at Columbia University's Arthur W. Diamond Law Library. Before becoming a law librarian, Professor Williams practiced public interest law in Maine, where she maintains admission to practice law. She holds a J.D. from Syracuse University College of Law, an M.L.I.S. from the University of Washington, and an M.A. in philosophy from Marquette University.
