Donna Nagy, Indiana University Maurer School of Law



<u>Bio</u>: Professor Donna Nagy is the C. Ben Dutton Professor of Business Law at Indiana University's Maurer School of Law. She joined the law school faculty in 2006 and served as executive associate dean from 2013-2019 and from 2020-2021. Professor Nagy teaches and writes in the areas of securities litigation, securities regulation, and corporations. Her scholarship includes co-authoring two books, one on the law of insider trading (with Ralph Ferrara and Herbert Thomas) and a casebook on Securities Litigation and Enforcement (with Margaret Sachs and Richard Painter, who served as the top White House ethics attorney for part of

President George W. Bush's Administration). Professor Nagy testified before both House and Senate committees during debate on the STOCK Act. She has written numerous law review articles on topics including the selective disclosure of government information, government officials and financial conflicts of interest, and insider trading and fiduciary principles. Professor Nagy is a member of the American Law Institute and served as an appointed member to the ABA Corporate Laws Committee. She also served a three-year term as a member of the National Adjudicatory Council of the Financial Industry Regulatory Authority (FINRA) and has held many leadership positions with the Association of American Law Schools. Before teaching, Professor Nagy was an associate with Debevoise & Plimpton in Washington, D.C., and specialized in securities enforcement and litigation. She received her B.A. from Vassar College and her J.D. from New York University Law School.
