CLINICAL ACTIVITIES SUMMARY

Clinical Leadership: My area of clinical focus for the past 20+ years has been the delivery of care for culturally diverse populations including providing immigrant and refugee specialty care for children, adolescents and adults. My areas of expertise include treatment of PTSD, depression and anxiety and substance use disorders. Before my current position here at UCSF, I was at BU School of Medicine, where I was the Director of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry (40% clinical). I was co-founder of the Refugee Immigrant Assistance Center Community Counseling Program in Boston, where I provided care in the collaborative interdisciplinary environment of a refugee resettlement agency. As the Chief of Psychiatry at ZSFG, I am responsible for the overall planning and assessment of the quality of clinical programs within the Department and for attending to the Department's clinical service delivery and insofar as it also advances our academic and teaching mission. I accomplish this cooperatively with the Division Directors and the leaders of specialty programs within the psychiatric services at ZSFG.

In academic year 2020-2021, I created a new Division of Integrated Behaviorally Health and work closely with the San Francisco Department of Public Health and UCSF departments across ZSFG in the further development of this division designed to enhance integrated and collaborative care and psychiatry consultation to outpatient medical and pediatric services at ZSFG.

Clinical Services: In this academic year 2021-2022 I continue to engage in direct clinical services (4 hours/week) at the ZSFG Child Adolescent Services clinic as preceptor for the Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Fellowship rotation (primarily tele-health currently). I am also working with Pulmonology at ZSFG in contributing to the development of a post COVID-19 interdisciplinary recovery clinic for individuals who have had ICU stays or hospitalized for COVID-19 severe illness or experiencing Long-Covid symptoms. This is currently a primarily Spanish speaking Latinx cohort of patients in need of pulmonology, rehab medicine, neuropsychology and psychiatric services.

I obtained CPG Strategic and Use of Reserve Funds to support a project titled, **Bilingual Mental Health and Wellness for Covid-19 Post-ICU and Long-COVID Recovery**. This project integrates a bilingual mental health clinician and intensive case management (0.4 FTE) and development of mental health and wellness resources for post-ICU Covid recovery and patients experiencing Long-COVID symptoms, in collaboration with the department of pulmonology and the Latinx community in the Mission District of San Francisco.

National: I am active in several national professional organizations which hold the mission of advancing quality clinical and systems of care for mental health, including American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and American Psychiatric Association.

I am currently Vice-Chair and Chief of Psychiatry at Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital, Vice-Chair of Psychiatry at UCSF. My leadership involvement and role contribute to University, Hospital (ZSFG) and San Francisco. I stepped into this leadership role in an important time of mental health service reform and transformation in the City of San Francisco. Additionally, very soon after my start at UCSF we entered the current pandemic. During the COVID 19 pandemic I have served on the UCSF Department of Psychiatry COVID 19 Executive Committee, and the COVID-19 Executive Recovery Leadership Committee and lead the COVID-19 Recovery Leadership Committee at ZSFG. My leadership role took on significant importance in the direction of supporting the 450 faculty and staff at ZSFG Department of Psychiatry in obtaining PPE, rapid transition to telehealth services and leading the Department of Psychiatry at ZSFG Division Directors through their planning in providing essential clinical services for our patients while implementing social distancing. This has included facilitating food donations to assist Citywide and OTOP (Opiate treatment) clinic clients and helping to institute the COPE support groups and wellness town halls for clinical staff at ZSFG. I was elected to the UCSF Medical School Faculty Council in 2021.

I have been working with the UCSF Latinx Center of Excellence and the Mission Economic Development Association (MEDA) in developing a FaceBook Live series on COVID-19 and mental health in Spanish for the Latinx community, given that the community has been heavily hit by the pandemic in the Mission District of San Francisco. Similarly, in 2021 I have been engaging with the Somos Esenciales, Essential Researchers Participatory Action Research group in the Mission District, to identify additional culturally responsive mental health services to be offered in partnership with the Latinx community. I have also been supporting our Citywide program, who continue to do outstanding work under the leadership of Director Fumi Mitsuishi, in obtaining philanthropic funds for expending their intensive case management to Shelter in Place (SIP) hotels with technology supported outreach and peer supports for homeless clients. I recently joined the Board of Directors of Cristosal, an international human rights organization working in Central and North America with displaced individuals and communities, and responding to victims of violence and human rights violations.

RESEARCH AND CREATIVE ACTIVITIES SUMMARY

I conduct health services research with a focus on Posttraumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and anxiety AND Latinx, refugee immigrant, child and adolescent mental health services research and intervention development. I have been an investigator on several national and international NIMH, NIDA, and foundation-funded studies of Latino and immigrant mental health including topics related to innovative models of behavioral health care delivery for adult and pediatric populations in primary care. My K23 NIDA Career Development Award focused on the development and implementation of CBT and Mindfulness integrated intervention for adolescents with co-occurring PTSD and Substance Use Disorders. This study included a subsample of unaccompanied immigrant children. My foundational independent research has been in the field of disparities health services research and therapy development. I have progressively moved to implementation science designs including use of technology for mental health intervention delivery. My most recent work includes serving as Dual PI of the Transforming and Expanding Access to Mental Health in Urban Pediatrics (TEAM UP for Children) a 4-year, \$10 million project aimed at increasing access to mental health care for children by expanding the ability of community health centers to prevent, identify, treat behavioral disorders, and engage families in care.

I was PI of a large multi-site, randomized, pragmatic clinical trial, KIDS FACE FEARS, comparing two modalities (face-to-face vs. web-based) delivery of anxiety treatment in English and Spanish for children and their families. During COVID-19 we have not been able to recruit any new participants to the Kids FACE FEARS study. In conversations with PCORI, the study design, scope and project duration and funding were significantly reduced and the primary grant remained at Boston Medical Center and the subcontract to UCSF and my PI role were discontinued. Central to my research is studying and identifying evidence based strategies for improving access and quality of care for traditionally underserved populations and primarily for addressing PTSD and other posttraumatic and co-occurring disorders.

I am one of the faculty investigators for the ZSFG/UCSF Latino Research Program and Internet World Health Research Center/CIELOS. In collaboration with UC Berkley and UC Irvine faculty--I am Co-I on an NIMH R01 proposal (site PI for ZSFG) called the SUPERA study, which is focused on digital delivery of therapy for depression and anxiety in Spanish (resubmission 2/2021). If funded, we will conduct an eight-week two-armed randomized trial comparing clinical outcomes for primary care patients receiving peer-networked or coach-

supported vs. the unsupported version of the SUPERA digital therapy intervention for depression (Hybrid Type 2 Implementation-Effectiveness Trial). I am MPI on a proposal to NIMHHD, Neurodevelopmental Pathways from Stressors to Mental Health Disorders and Academic Risk, which is due for review in February 2021. I am co-I on a proposal to NIMH on telehealth intervention for juvenile justice involved girls, focused on cannabis use and mental health. I am currently preparing additional R01 proposals with colleagues, on digital interventions for improving access to child mental health services in primary care and preparing a center of excellence proposal focused on public psychiatry innovation and mental health equity across the lifespan.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, rates of depressive and stress related symptoms are higher than in normal times. During this time of physical distancing, pregnant women experience disruption in the support that is usually routinely made available to them during this crucial period. For example, in-person prenatal visits with their physicians, prenatal classes, and other occasions to obtain social support are being curtailed; anxiety regarding the unknown medical risks of COVID-19 during pregnancy is also exacerbated by financial stressors, posing particular risk for disenfranchised women of color and for negatively impacting maternal-infant well-being. The pilot study would provide an opportunity to examine mood and stress levels during this time for perinatal women and the potential for preventing the onset of Major Depression Disorder or increasing severity progression of mild depressive symptoms with the help of a remote digital intervention to supplement care during pregnancy. Although this pilot project was not funded, we will go forward in conducting it as an unfunded project.

This proposal aims to implement and evaluate an evidence-based digital cognitive-behavioral therapy intervention in safety-net primary care clinics for Spanish speaking Latinx patients with depression and/or anxiety. Primary care is the de facto treatment setting for the treatment of common mental health problems such as depression and anxiety and Latinx patients tend to prefer to remain treated in primary care rather than being referred to other specialty mental health services. We will conduct an effectiveness-implementation hybrid trial (Type 2) design with both provider- and patient-level randomization. This will generate data on effectiveness of digital peer support for mental health outcomes for Latinx patients while simultaneously generating rigorous data on the implementation strategies with the highest chance of dissemination in future work. 5. Change SF and La Borinqueña: Youth Mental Health Ambassadors at ZSFG

Project planning and obtained funding through a HEARTS Grants for The Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at ZSFG with the ZSFG Latinx and Black Task Forces. The Campaign focuses on trauma, resilience, positive racial identity for youth whose communities are disproportionately impacted by Covid-19 and racial trauma. two components that together will ameliorate stigma regarding mental health care and supports for wellness, while also increasing visibility of the services offered through ZSFG: 1) Mental Health Campaign Featuring La Borinqueña/> La Borinquena was created by Edgardo Miranda-Rodriguez, who decided to create his own comic starring a Puerto Rican woman Marisol, who becomes the hero La Borinqueña. This comic centers on her experiences as an Afro-Latina and journey to embracing her culture, intellectual strengths, power and well-being. Through the comic, the artist expands on the positive representations of the Black, Latinx, Indigenous and People of Color Community. La Borinqueña, has been the face of several public service announcements on everything from voting, Black Lives Matter, and health topics. The artist has agreed to create an animated PSA and poster on mental health for the diverse BIPOC community and allies and to do a virtual artist's talk open to the ZSFG community and local schools. In addition, we plan to have a local youth leader's panel on the topic of mental health, well-being and identity. 2) Change SF Wellness Mental Health ambassadors and workforce pipeline. In collaboration with the San Francisco Human Rights Commission and SF Mayor Breed's Opportunities for All initiative program, ZSFG will host a cohort of 8 high school and community college interns for a 1-2 year mental health and wellness workforce placement and who will be the inaugural ambassadors.
