U.S. Senator Byron L. Dorgan served as a Congressman and Senator for North Dakota for 30 years before retiring from the U.S. Senate in 2011.

Dorgan's public service career began at age 26, when he was appointed North Dakota State Tax Commissioner. He was the youngest constitutional officer in North Dakota's history. Dorgan served as tax commissioner of North Dakota from 1969 until 1980.

Dorgan was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives in 1980 and served there until he was elected to the U.S. Senate in 1992. He served in the Senate Leadership for 16 years, first as Assistant Democratic Floor Leader and then as Chairman of the Democratic Policy Committee. He was Chairman of Senate Committees and Subcommittees on the issues of Energy, Aviation, Appropriations, Water and Energy, and Indian Affairs.

Senator Dorgan is now active in his post Senate life teaching, speaking, consulting, writing and much more.

He is a recognized leader in the fields of energy policy, economic issues, aviation policy, Indian issues, trade policy, health care and more. He is considered a compelling public speaker and one of the best debaters who served in the U.S. Senate.

Senator Dorgan is a Visiting Professor at two Universities lecturing on energy, economic policy and political affairs. He works part time as a Senior Policy Advisor with the Washington D.C. law firm Arent Fox LLP. He is also a Senior Fellow with the Bipartisan Policy Center, a Washington D.C. think tank, focusing primarily on energy issues. And he is Chairing a new program at the Aspen Institute – The Center for Native American Youth – that assists Native American children with an emphasis on teen suicide prevention.

The Senator is the author of three books. The first, a New York Times Bestseller book “Take this Job and Ship It,” and a second book released in 2009, “Reckless... How Debt, Deregulation and Dark Money Nearly Bankrupted America (And How We Can Fix It).” He just co-authored a novel “Blowout” that was published in March of 2012 and has a contract to write another book in this “eco-thriller” series due out this summer.

Senator Dorgan is represented by Leading Authorities, a Washington D.C. speakers and lecture bureau that represents public figures available for speaking opportunities.

Senator Dorgan earned a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of North Dakota, and a Masters of Business Administration from the University of Denver. He is married to Kim Dorgan and has four children: Scott, Shelly (deceased), Brendon, and Haley.
