

Katherine Oyama is Head of Global IP Policy for Google in Washington, DC. From 2009 to 2011, she worked at the White House as Associate Counsel and Deputy Counsel to Vice President Joseph R. Biden. Prior to her government service, Katherine was an IP litigation associate at Wilmer Cutler Pickering Hale & Dorr's Washington office. She previously worked for a New York based strategy consulting firm; Marc Andreessen's Silicon Valley-based startup, LoudCloud; and a Washington-based public interest research organization.

Katherine is a graduate of Smith College, where she graduated with High Honors in Government, and the University of California, Berkeley School of Law (Boalt Hall), where she served as senior articles editor of the Berkeley Technology Law Journal (BTLJ). She has testified before Congress on issues relating to copyright, trademark, intermediary liability, and the creative economy multiple times. In addition to her work in the U.S., Katie has represented Google on global trade and digital economy issues at the United Nations (UN), Internet Governance Forum (IGF), World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO), World Trade Organization (WTO), European Union (EU), U.S. Mission to the EU, World Economic Forum (WEF) and met with policymakers on 6 continents.

She is a Board Member of the Digital Media Association (DiMA) (the leading digital music services organization in the U.S.) and serves on the Advisory Boards of the Duke Law Center for Innovation Policy, the American Library Association Public Policy Advisory Council (PPAC), and the Atlas Corp Tech Advisory Board; she is a University of Cambridge (UK) Policy Fellow.
